

#### Their Perspective:

- 1) "Jesus of Nazareth"
- 2) Describing a Prophet like Moses

#### What is lacking in their interpretation:

1) Understanding Jesus as God's Great Prophet

Deut. 18:15, 18 "The LORD your God will raise up for you a <u>prophet like me</u> from among you, from your countrymen, you shall listen to him. 'I will raise up a prophet from among their countrymen like you, and I will put My words in his mouth, and he shall speak to them all that I command him.

Acts 3:22 "Moses said, 'The Lord God will raise up for you a prophet like me from your brethren; to Him you shall give heed to everything He says to you.

#### What is lacking in their interpretation:

- 1) Understanding Jesus as God's Great Prophet
- 2) Thinking of Jesus as ONLY a Prophet

Luke 24:25-27

#### **HIS Perspective**:

"Was it not necessary for Messiah to suffer...?"

#### What's His Point?

1) He WAS a Prophet and they were all treated like this

2) He predicted it AS a Prophet

3) Consistent with being Messiah

Luke 24:28-35

#### Notice 2 things:

- 1) The Spirit again USES THE STORY the Word
- 2) Jesus never tells them to DO ANYTHING

#### 3 thoughts in closing:

- 1. His <u>life</u> was at the center of the human struggle over how it should be lived out
- 2. His **suffering and rejection and death** validates Him in His role as the final and Great Prophet and King in line with all those that suffered before Him
- 3. His <u>resurrection</u> vindicates Him = that He was true all along
